

Are you interested in saving up to 50 percent on out-of-pocket costs for some of your medications?

If so, we would like to introduce you to the Physicians Plus Tablet Splitting Program. This program saves you money by cutting your drug copay in half. The program is simple — your doctor prescribes a tablet strength that is double your usual dose and you take one-half a tablet (which is equal to your usual dose). Tablets are easy to break using a tablet splitter that Physicians Plus will provide free of charge. Because you are receiving fewer pills with each prescription, your copay will be cut in half (e.g. \$20 brand copay is reduced to \$10).

How do I get started on the Physicians Plus Tablet Splitting Program?

You need to be prescribed the double strength version of your current medicine to participate in the tablet splitting program. Call your prescriber’s office and ask to participate in the Physicians Plus Tablet Splitting Program. Your prescriber may then update your prescription with your pharmacy.

Can I split all of my medications?

No, not all drugs are appropriate for tablet splitting. Always check with your prescriber or pharmacist before splitting any new prescription medications in half. Also note that only select medications are available for the copay-lowering benefit in the Physicians Plus Tablet Splitting Program.
